Doing that which is our duty

In the sixth chapter of the book of Ephesians, there are sundry-duties listed that are enjoined upon Christians., such as children obeying their parents, honoring our fathers and mothers, servants being obedient to masters, masters treating their servants justly, and finally, our putting on the whole armour of God and standing in the fight.

Children are commanded to obey their parents in the Lord, "For this is right," That is what the Lord expects of them.

I once heard a young man boast that on the job in a factory he, along with a number of other workers, wasted several hours on the job on coffee breaks. Sometimes, we act as men-pleasers. We should be doing our work "as to the Lord, and not unto men." (Eph. 6:7) It doesn't matter so much whether or not the boss sees us as it does that the Lord always sees us.

It is true that many times, more so in years past than in the present age, employers have taken unfair advantage of their employees. They sometimes have no feelings for the needs of their employees. But Christ and the Father, whom we serve, are not that way; and neither is there respect of persons with him." (v. 9) The apostle Peter tells us, "For the eyes of the Lord are over the righteous, and his ears are open unto their prayers: but the face of the Lord is against them that do evil." (1 Pet. 3:12)

The thing that we as Christians need to keep in mind is that we are the servants of God. We should not think that we have done any great thing when we have exhausted our every effort to keep the commandments of God. That is only what we should have done. Jesus taught that lesson in the 7th chapter of Luke: "But which of you, having a servant plowing or feeding cattle, will say unto him by and by, when he is come from the field, Go and sit down to meat? And will not rather say unto him, Make ready where with I may sup, and gird thyself, and serve me, till I have eaten and drunken; and afterward thou shalt eat and drink? Doeth he thank that servant because he did the things that were commanded him? I trow (think) not. So likewise ye, when ye shall have done all those things which are commanded you, say, we are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do." (Luke 7:7-10)

God is not an unjust Master, but he is our Master. He bought us with the blood of his Son. It is our duty to keep his commandments. The apostle John said, "For this is the love of God that we keep his commandments; and his commandments are not grievous." (1 John 5:3) That is, he is not asking us to do something that is unthinkably difficult or unreasonable. We are to put on the whole armor of God and fight the battle against the wiles of the devil. If we fail to keep his commandments, we are no better than the slacker on the job in the factory. God is not going to bid us sit down to enjoy the bliss of heaven until we have done our duty here on earth. ~W.L. Totty

Mimeographs Are Not Lost Technology

With the advances in technology over the last half-a-century, the word "mimeograph" and the whole history of mimeograph technology is being lost as a relic of the past. Before photocopy machines, there were mimeograph systems, which created a stencil through which ink was forced onto paper. Using that stencil, numerous copies could be made over and over, which would match the stencil. Look at the word "mimeograph" and recognize that the copies that were made from a stencil would actually "mimic" (look like) the stencil.

What does all of this have to do with us? The Greek word, from which we get our English words "mimic" and "mimeograph," is found a handful of times in the New Testament. Keeping in mind the mimicking nature of a mimeograph machine duplicating the original stencil, consider how God uses this word to instruct Christians.

As Christians, we must mimic the Lord! "Therefore be imitators of God" (Eph. 5:1). "Become imitators...of the Lord" (1 Thess. 1:6). He is the stencil; we are the blank sheets of paper onto which His image must be stamped and exhibited! When others look at you, can they see the imprint of the original stencil? Do they recognize whose image you bear?

As Christians, we must mimic the faithful of the past! "Imitate those who through faith and patience inherit the promises" (Heb. 6:12). Lives of faithful imitators of God are detailed in Scripture "for our learning" (Rom. 15:4) and "as an example" to mimic (1 Cor. 10:11). We must strive to look like them, duplicating their faithfulness in our own lives!

As Christians, we must mimic the faith of our leaders! "Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith" (Heb. 13:7). Look back at the lives of faithful elders and mimic their faith in your own life, as they mimicked the image of Christ!

As Christians, we must mimic good and not evil! As the apostle John contrasted the divisive, self-centered nature of Diotrephes with the proven, faithful character of Demetrius, John urged his readers, "Beloved, do not imitate what is evil, but what is good. He who does good is of God, but he who does evil has not seen God" (3 John 11). Which stencil are we using—evil or good? One stencil is "of God" and the other has never been in the presence of God! Does your life mimic what is good (to look like God) or what is evil (to look like the world?

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Stress. The very word itself, just saying it, is distressing! It closely resembles "stretched," which is what some stress feels like. It rhymes with "press," which is what other stress feels like. Life often has a way of gripping us with tension, worry, anxiety and troubles of all sorts. When stress has you stressed, may I encourage you to take a moment (you can afford just one quick moment) to find a place of isolation, close your eyes, take an extra-deep breath, exhale very slowly, and remember these wonderful truths:

- (1)God is with you (Josh. 1:9). Stop and say it, "God is with me!"
- (2)God loves you(1 John 4:19). Stop and say it, "God loves me!"
- (3)God wants to help you (Psa. 46:1; Heb. 13:6). Stop and say it, "God wants to help me!"
- (4)God wants what is best for you (Deut. 6:24; Rom. 8:28). Stop and say it, "God wants what is best for Now, go back to #1 and go through it again (and again). Trust God! Trust that He knows! Trust that He cares! Trust that He is your God! (Via Palm Beach Church of Christ Bulletin)
