People just may be inclined to listen better to our statements of beliefs and read our positions if they can see from our lives that we truly believe them and are willing to live and die for them. When the contradictory actions of Christians stop making so much noise, then folks might be able to hear the message we are trying to deliver – a message that they desperately need to hear. Let us silence the voice of the enemies of Christ by so living that they will have no justifiable grounds for their hateful charges. Our Reconciliation in Christ

Only Jesus can save us from our sins. "And in none other is there salvation: for neither is there any other name under heaven, that is given among men, wherein we must be saved." (Acts 4:12) Thus, it is only in Christ that we can come back (be reconciled) to God. Jesus said, "I am the truth, and the life: no one cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6). He wen to the cross to shed the blood that was necessary to bring us back to the Father. ""Having made peace through the blood of his cross: through Him, I say, whether things upon the earth, or things in the heavens" (Col 1:20). Only those who come to the blood of Jesus can be reconciled, for the blood of Jesus is the only means of being reconciled to God.

The apostle wrote of this in the book of Romans. "But God commendeth his own love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. Much more then, being now justified by his blood, shall we be saved from the wrath of God through him. For if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more, being reconciled, shall we be saved by his life" (Rom. 5:8-10). Just a few verses later, he adds, "Or are ye ignorant that all we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him through baptism unto death that like as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:3-4). It is ini Christ that we are reconciled, by His death and by means of his blood. Thus until one is baptized into Christ and into His death, he is not reconciled to God.

There are many who will claim that man cannot live righteously, that we are saved by "faith only", and that righteous living has nothing to do with salvation. But Jesus proved that man can live righteously, for "we have not a high priest that cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but one that hath been in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin" (Heb. 4:15). And note the importance of God's righteousness. "The righteous shall live by faith" (Romans 1:17). "For the grace of God hath appeared, bringing salvation to all men, instructing us, to the intent that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly and righteously and godly in this present word" (Titus 2:11-12). If one is living by faith, he is righteous. If one is living for Christ, he is living "soberly and righteous and Godly." When we are baptized into Christ" (Rom. 6:3), we then, "become the righteousness of God in him" (2 Cor. 5:21).

When we are ""in Christ" (Rom. 6:3), we are in fellowship with God. The apostle John writes of great blessings that are ours as a result. "If we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7). Because we are in Christ, living for Him, "There is therefore now no condemnation to them that are in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 8:1). Paul expressed it this way earlier in Romans. "Blessed is the man to whom, the Lord will not reckon sin" (Rom. 4:8). Being "in Christ" means that his blood constantly cleanses us so that we are in constant fellowship with God. ~Clem Thurman

Moving the Comma

Alexander III was Tsar of Russia from 1881-1894. His rule was marked by repression, and in particular by persecution of Jews. His wife, Maria Fedorovna, provided a stark contrast, being known for her generosity to those in need. On one occasion her husband had signed an order consigning a prisoner to life in exile. It read simply, "Pardon impossible, to be sent to Siberia." Maria changed that prisoner's life by moving the comma in her husband's order. She altered it to "Pardon, impossible to be sent to Siberia."

"All of us have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23) "And the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23).

Jesus taught that each person is traveling one of two roads: "Enter by the narrow gate: for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction and there are many who go in by it. Because narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and there are few who find it" (Matthew 7:13, 14).

Because of our sin, we are traveling down the road to destruction, to Hell. Our situation was hopeless until, through Christ "the comma was moved".

Because of His great love for us, God sent His Son Jesus to die on the cross four our sins (John 3:16). Jesus paid the price for our sins so that we might have forgiveness and receive the gift of eternal life (Eph. 1:7); Rom 6:23)

God has promised to save those who will place their faith and trust in Jesus (Acts 16:30,31), turn from their sins in repentance (Acts 17:30,31), confess Jesus before men (Rom. 10:9,10), and are baptized (immersed) into Christ for the forgiveness of their sins (Acts 2:38). He will continue to cleanse those who continue to walk in the light of His Word (1 John 1:7).

"There is therefore now no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus, who do not walk according to the flesh, but according to the Spirit. For the Law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has made me free from the law of sin and death" (Romans 8: 1,2,4).

In Christ, God has changed the comma that stood against us. From "Pardon impossible, send to Hell" comes the good news of salvation: "Pardon, impossible to send to Hell."

Won't you all God to "move the comma" in your life by accepting His offer of forgiveness and life?
