The Means of Holiness

When we are in Christ we are in a holy state and through Him we are empowered to live a holy life (Gal. 2:20; Phil. 4:13). We can't do it on our own. We need the Holy Spirit infilling our lives day by day (Eph. 5:18), and God is willing to give us of his Spirit (Luke 11:13). God will keep us, "And the God of peace himself sanctify you wholly; and may your spirit and soul and body be preserved entire, without blame at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Faithful is he that calleth you, who will also do it" (1 Th. 5:23 - 24)
