- (6) Be fruitful in every good work
- (7) Be increasing in the knowledge of God
- (8) Be strengthened by His glorious power
- (9) Have patience, longsuffering, and joy

Read the list again and visualize what would happen when this prayer was answered!

Look What Jesus Did When He Was Hurting

"C'mon, life! Gimme a break, would you!" Are you tired? Are you discouraged? Are you ready to give up? Does it seem like everything is against you? Are people and circumstances pushing you into deep loneliness or deep frustration or both? What should you do? Answer: Do what Jesus did!

Take a few minutes and think through the life of Jesus. What did Jesus do when He grew tired, discouraged, disappointed, lonely and frustrated? What did Jesus do when people and circumstances were out to get Him? There is much for us to learn.

When Jesus was awakened to the faithlessness of His friends, He went and helped two men who were having a really bad day (Matt. 8:23-32). When Jesus was told to go away and that He was not wanted (although He had just done a good deed), He went and cheered up another man (Matt. 9:1-7). When Jesus was interrupted and taken advantage of, He turned and was kind to the person who disrupted what He was doing (Matt. 9:18-22).

When critics continued to accuse Jesus for doing things they didn't like, He found a man who was hurting and made a positive difference in his life (Matt. 12:9-13). When His enemies were plotting against Him and trying to do away with Him, Jesus withdrew from them and helped some others (Matt. 12:14-15). When some of those closest to Him were offended at Him, He still sought to do nice things for them (Matt. 13:53-58), and when they wanted nothing to do with Him, Jesus went and did good to another man (Luke 4:16-37).

When Jesus felt like He needed to pull back to Himself, especially after repeated frustrations and personal loss, He actually was moved with compassion for others who were hurting and He did what He could to help them, even serving them a meal (Matt. 14:1-21). When those closest to Him continued to struggle with various things, He went out of His way to encourage them and lend them a hand (Matt. 14:22-33).

Even in His darkest moment—when most people would surely have turned inward by now and would be focused on self and would be ready to give up due to discouragement and frustration—Jesus was concerned about others (Luke 23:34, 43) and Jesus was taking care of others (John 19:25-27).

What do we learn from Jesus? What does Jesus teach us to do when life seems unfair and falling in on us, when we get tired and discouraged and disappointed and lonely? The lesson that rings loud and clear throughout the life of Jesus is to get up, go out and... Serve others. Do good unto others. Help others. When it would be easy to focus on self, instead focus on other people. That's what Jesus did.

Incredibly Strong and Weak

"Afterward it happened that he loved a woman in the Valley of Sorek, whose name was Delilah. And the lords of the Philistines came up to her and said to her, 'Entice him, and find out where his great strength lies, and by what means we may overpower him, that we may bind him to afflict him; and every one of us will give you eleven hundred pieces of silver" (Judges 16:4-5).

Because of the evil they had done, God delivered Israel over to the Philistines who oppressed them for 40 years (Judges 13:1). God raised up Samson to deliver Israel from the Philistines (Judges 13:2-25). Samson is mentioned as being a great man of faith (Hebrews 11:32), but he is also a man who struggled with his own weaknesses, sexual temptations, which eventually led to his demise.

As the opening verses above indicate, Samson loved a Philistine woman named Delilah (Judges 16:4). Earlier, he had married a Philistine woman (Judges 14:1-4). After his wife was given to another man and eventually killed by the Philistines (Judges 15:1-6), Samson goes to the Philistine city of Gaza and has sexual relations with a harlot at the time he was judging Israel (Judges 15:20; 16:1). He then enters a relationship with Delilah who entices him to reveal the secret of his strength (Judges 16:15-18). She then has his head shaven. Samson's strength leaves him as the Lord departs from him. The Philistines capture him and put out his eyes (Judges 16:19-21).

As I look at this account, it is easy to see that Samson was physically incredibly strong. However, spiritually, he was incredibly weak when it came to his ability to withstand sexual temptations. Because he did not control these sexual desires, but rather let these desires control him, time and time again, we see him committing sexual sins (cf. James 1:14-15).

As I consider myself and how this applies to me, I need to be mindful of areas in my life where I am spiritually weak and be aware of sinful desires with which I may struggle and need to keep under control. I need to realize how the devil uses these desires to lead me astray. All of us struggle with inappropriate desires that lead to sin. Samson struggled with sexual desires. Delilah struggled with love of money. She was willing to hand Samson, a man who loved her (Judges 16:4), over to the Philistines for 1100 pieces of silver (Judges 16:5). The sinful desires with which you struggle most are probably not the same ones with which I struggle. Even though he struggled with these desires and fell into sin, God was still able to use Samson to accomplish his purposes to deliver Israel from the Philistines (Judges 16:4). Even though Samson time and time again fell into sexual sin, he still displayed great faith in God (Hebrews 11:32) when at the end of his life he calls on God to give him strength one last time that he may push the pillars of the temple of the Philistines down causing its destruction, his death, and the death of 3000 Philistines (Judges 16:28-30). None of this excuses Samson's sin. It just shows that God can use people, who struggle with their weaknesses and display faith in Him, to accomplish great things.

Today, I will rejoice that God can use me even though I struggle with my own weaknesses. I will strive to guard against temptation, especially being mindful of my own inappropriate desires and how these lead to sin. I will seek the way of escape from temptation which God has provided!

"Therefore, let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall. No temptation has overtaken you except such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able, but with the temptation will also make the way of escape, that you may be able to bear it" (1 Corinthians 10:12-13) ~Daily Devo, Susquehanna Valley Church of Christ, March 8, 2021
